Notes of Thanks

The theme for the month of November is Thanksgiving – at least that is how it appears as turkey and pilgrim decorations appear amidst the Halloween sale items and the early bird Christmas gifts. Our country sets aside one day during the year to focus on giving thanks. Originally a harvest festival, it is a day in which to thank God for all of life's blessings.

Later this month on November 24th, we will gather with others to share a meal and give thanks as well. Many will take the opportunity to name at least one thing for which they are thankful. Maybe you will pause amongst the preparations and give thanks to God in that moment – even when surrounded by chaos or mayhem.

It is important for us to stop, reflect and take the opportunity to give our thanks to God. We may offer our thanks at other times – when we receive good news or the bad news that we expected has been turned around. We may even write thank you notes (or emails) to express our gratitude.

I will admit that I have never been particularly good at thank you notes. I readily offer verbal words of thanks – even to the toll booth collector or the person who holds a door open for me, but writing notes themselves ... well ... I have no good reason or answer.

However, I do like to receive thank you notes – in fact, I keep a folder of them to read on those

days when I'm not feeling very good about myself. These notes – more than just the verbal words – lift my spirits.

As much as I preach and teach about the importance of thanking God for all our blessings, I need to remind myself about being intentional about offering my thanks both to God as well as those around me – for relationships are the greatest blessing and ones that I often take for granted.

For the month of November, I invite you to join me in giving intentional thanks to God for all the blessings in our lives. I will be sending out daily (!) notes to people in my own life for which I am thankful. Sometimes, it may be for something specific and other times, it may be “just because” of who they are and what they mean to me.

May we reflect the words that are sung “*now thank we all our God with hearts and hands and voices*” (ELW #840)

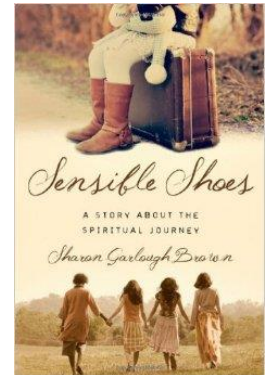
- Digital ministry – how might we enhance our website as well as offer additional resources to help people in their faith journeys – i.e. Prayer group that receives prayer requests on line.

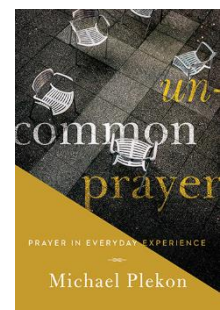
This is wonderful book that helps us look at our own faith experiences and the ways in which we too might grow deeper in our relationship with God.

Thanks-Living

We live in a time and a culture that often focuses on what we lack rather than what we have. We operate from a perspective of scarcity rather than abundance. Culture entices us to fill our lives with all that it has to offer – and yet, we still are left wanting.

Stewardship looks at what we have rather than what we are lacking. Stewardship, at its core, is about the blessings that have been entrusted to us. In the beginning, God said to humanity “here is all that I have made. I give it to you to take care of it so that all may prosper.” (Genesis 1 & 2).

Translations of this text often say that we are to “subdue” it, which we have taken to mean to take it under our control and use it however we want. Yet, it is not ours to control – everything is God’s because God is the one who created everything. All that we have and all that we are is loaned to us by God – not just our stuff or our money, but our relationships with others as well.

Entrusted by God with our very lives and the world around us, we are mindful of this gift and seek to be good stewards of it. This perspective enables us to see abundance rather than scarcity. And in doing so, we live thankfully as we care for that which has been entrusted to us.

How are you living thankfully? How are you stewarding that which has been entrusted to you?

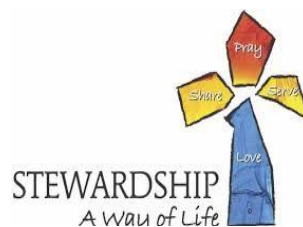

Daylight Savings Time Ends Sunday November 6th

Remember to set your clock back one hour before you go to be don Saturday November 5th.

With the change in time and seasons, here are some other things to remember ...

- Check and replace the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide (CO) alarms. Ensure they are working properly and replace the batteries. As the cold sets in and many start up their gas-fired furnaces, fireplaces, portable unit heaters and the like for the first time, carbon monoxide poisoning risks increase dramatically during this time of year. Replace any smoke alarm unit that is older than 10 years. Replace any CO alarm unit that is older than 5 years.
- Prepare a winter emergency kit for your automobile. Such kits can be a lifesaver if you are stuck out in bad weather while driving. They should include items such as: warm clothes, blanket, flashlight, batteries, water, non-perishable snacks, shovel, flares, reflective hazard triangle, jumper cables, cat litter or sand for traction, ski hat and gloves.
- Check to see if your fire extinguishers need recharging. Check the small gauge at the top of the extinguisher. If the needle in that gauge is in the green, chances are, the extinguisher is okay. If it is in the red, you need to have the extinguisher recharged.
