The Magnificat



*And Mary said,
'My soul magnifies the Lord,
and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior,
for he has looked with favor on the lowliness of
his servant.*

*Surely, from now on all generations will call
me blessed;
for the Mighty One has done great things for me,
and holy is his name.*

*His mercy is for those who fear him
from generation to generation.*

*He has shown strength with his arm;
he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of
their hearts.*


*He has brought down the powerful from their
thrones,*

*and lifted up the lowly;
he has filled the hungry with good things,
and sent the rich away empty.*

*He has helped his servant Israel,
in remembrance of his mercy,
according to the promise he made to our
ancestors,*

to Abraham and to his descendants forever.'

The Magnificat is a beautiful song of praise by Mary. Its powerful words have entranced composers throughout the years. Each rendition seeks to evoke the power proclaimed from the words of this young girl – words of joy as well as words of hope for a different future.



I would suspect that Mary did not realize the extent to which her hope-filled words would come to fruition through the child that was entrusted to her. While they echoed the words of Hannah, a long barren woman who became pregnant with a prophet (I Samuel 2:1-10), they hold forth a vision of a different world than the one in which she found herself.

What about this song speaks to our world today? What words might we sing in a song of praise and hope today? What is God's hope and vision for us this year?

I invite you to listen to different renditions of this song as a part of your time of preparation in this Advent season. Think about how you might re-write these words for today. Use the Magnificat as a prayer as well as a vision of hope.

This is a season of preparation for the advent/coming of our Lord. We are preparing for more than just another holiday season but for the coming of Christ in and through us today.

Advent is a season of preparation and anticipation

In the midst of your yearly preparations, take the opportunity to reflect on the ways in which your faith is a part of your preparations. Here are a few ideas:

ELCA Good Gifts – in addition to your regular gift giving, begin a new tradition by supporting the ELCA World Hunger ministries by symbolically purchasing a goat, chicken or other animals. You can go to www.elca.org/hunger

Reverse Advent Calendar – as we mark the days towards Christmas, you gather food items to give to Putnam CAP instead of the candy filled calendar that can be bought in the store. Pick up a copy at church. It extends through the 12 days of Christmas. You can bring items in each week or at the end of the calendar (food is always needed)

Advent Devotions – Resources you can use:


- + Use the weekly bulletin insert, reflecting on the ways that we see Christ in our midst.
- + Pick up a copy of a booklet called “A Series of Advent Devotions.” It contains reflections from our Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton, as well as three other leaders from the Episcopal Church, the Lutheran Church of Canada and the Anglican Church of Canada.
- + Pick up the weekly “Advent Meditations” booklet that have coloring sheets to supplement the readings.

Advent Wreath – Using 4 candles, mark the weeks until Christmas, lighting one candle a week. Use the prayers that we use during worship as a part of your own time of prayer at home.

Bless your Christmas tree, Nativity scenes and presents – Give thanks for the different ornaments on the tree, noting those special ones that you have received over the years. Pray for your family as you gather around the tree.


Other resources for Advent: Pick up a booklet at church that has other resources for you to use.

Off the Shelf



As we live in the midst of a divided country, we are in need of ways to come together. A powerful example of this is the conversation between the Dalai Lama and Desmond Tutu who in midst of their religious differences found common ground in *The Book of Joy: Lasting Happiness in a Changing World*. Rather than putting aside the suffering of the world, they invite us to walk through it to find a joy that we cannot create on our own.

Coupled with this book is *The Book of Forgiving; the Fourfold Path of Healing Ourselves and our World* written by Desmond Tutu and his daughter, Mhpo Tutu as they share his experiences with the Truth and Reconciliation committee that worked to bring healing after the end of apartheid in South Africa.



We will be discussing these books together as we reflect on our current day realities in our country. A date will be set for January. Copies of the book will be available to borrow from the church library.

In the midst of these holidays, stress often increases and many people find it difficult to get into that “holiday spirit”. The birth of Christ is more than a holiday but rather a “holy-day”, a sacred time when we remember the harsh reality that the Christ-child was born into – with a manger for a bed, refugee status as they seek to escape Herod’s violence along with Roman occupation.

Christ is born into the midst of our own hardships and stresses. This is where we are met by the loving grace and peace of our Lord. During the Longest Night Service, we offer the opportunity for people to name their sorrow, frustrations and difficulties. We bring them into the presence of Christ to seek healing, strength and peace. This is a powerful service that speaks the true significance of the birth of Jesus.

ELCA's Anti-Racism Training Event Report

On Saturday, November 12th, Pastor Jen, Joan Bradley, Georgina Marek, Dawn Morello, and I attended a NY Synod anti-racism training event. As a part of the 2015 Synod Assembly, the Metropolitan New York Synod committed to addressing racism in our church and society, and providing anti-racism training. The purpose of the event was to define racism, explore its history, understand its connection with systems, institutions and policies in the US, and determine our next steps in our church community for talking about racism and advocating for change.

Our day started off defining racial prejudice as an individual's negative attitude towards a group of people based on race. It is socialized into every person but it does not mean that everyone is racist. We then defined racism where the systems and institutions of society enforce one group's racial prejudices and grant power and privilege, thereby limiting the power and privilege of those racial groups not in power.

Systems and institutions in society have enforced racial prejudices since early in the history of the United States when early settlers killed the inhabitants of the land they wanted to seize. During early times racial prejudice was implanted as people were sorted in racial categories to recognize the natural supremacy of whites. This has continued throughout history and has created a society that defines those who are privileged as male, educated, good work ethic, land ownership, English speaking, documented wealthy materialistic, and self-sufficient, while non-whites or non-privileged are considered disabled, poor, uneducated, inferior, women, lazy, learning disabled refugees, and undocumented.

Our government including its institutions and systems create, manage, and distribute resources necessary for life, such as education, banking, medicine, that are structured intentionally to serve white society exclusively. We live in a society that is structured by race, white and non-white.

Racism also shapes our identity as shown with a socialization process that teaches non-white people to believe, accept, and live-out negative definitions of self and to fit into and live out inferior roles, while white people believe, accept and live out superior societal definitions of self and define behaviors to live out superior roles.

During the last part of the day, we sat together as a church group and using a chart, [Continuum on Becoming an Anti-Racist Multicultural Organization](#), we tried to determine where Trinity was in addressing racism. We found that Trinity is similar to many other Lutheran churches in the ELCA and needs more education and advocacy towards eliminating racism. This is a journey, which includes changes within the federal government, and its institutions and systems to eliminate racism.

With your generosity we provided 60-70 homeless men and women with a warm breakfast sandwich, a bagged lunch with a sandwich including fruit, granola bars, candy, egg, juice, a set of underwear, a toiletry kit, and assorted warm clothing. They were very thankful and appreciative of your caring.

Breakdown of the monies collected and spent:

- Underwear (t-shirt, briefs, socks) \$324.24

Seafarer's Christmas-at-Sea

Seafarer's International House (SIH) is an ecumenical mission of the Evangelical Lutheran Church and provides pastoral care, social assistance, and advocacy to seafarers and sojourners.

All of us look forward to Christmas with family and friends. For nearly all seafarers, Christmas is a lonely day in the middle of an ocean, without family or friends. This year Trinity will participate in the Seafarer's Christmas-at-Sea and help to bring a little joy to these men and women.

SIH will provide us with 25 satchels which we will fill after our first service on Sunday, December 11th. Items needed for each satchel are:

- One Sweatshirt (with or without hood (L-XL)
- Three Pairs of Socks – thermal or white gym
- One Casual Pullover T-Shirt (size M-L)
- One Knit Winter Cap
- One Can of Nuts or Large Bar of Chocolate

Close the Gap (aka Checkbook Balance)

Why do we have a deficit in our budget?

Our 2016 projected budget was	\$231,105
Our actual YTD expenses are	\$185,041
Our 2016 projected income was	\$204,305
Our actual YTD income is	\$163,330
Leaving a projected deficit of	\$ 26,800
Our actual YTD deficit is	\$ 21,711
Beginning 2016 Checkbook balance	\$ 13,765
Borrowed from our Endowment Fund	\$ 10,000
Giving us a checkbook balance	\$ 23,765
Minus our actual YTD deficit	\$ 21,711
Checkbook balance	\$ 2,045


Assuming the same numbers for next year, and borrowing the remainder of the Endowment Fund of \$10,000, we should run out of money about June of next year. So it is imperative to get the checkbook back up to at least \$15,000 by year end if we intend to survive as a church past June 2017.

The good news is, we have raised about \$9,000 for our Close the Gap effort, but the bad news is, we are about \$4,000 behind in our giving, so the net (good news – bad news) is about \$5,000 added to the checkbook. Go church! We still need to raise about \$10,000 more before the end of the year. We can do it!


