Pastoral Reflections – 25 Years & Counting

On November 2, 1992, I was ordained as a minister of Word and Sacrament. In many ways, it feels as if it was just yesterday and yet, still a lifetime ago. Think about all the things that have happened in your own life as well as the world around us in the past 25 years – for instance, there was a time when we did not have email, the internet, and cell phones!

There are so many things that I could name about the changes in my own life as well as how the Church itself has changed in these years - from a green hymnal to a blue to a red; from Communion once a month to every week; from Sunday school to Faith Formation. The changes also involved three different locations and ministries – from St. John's (Elma, NY) to Zion with St. Matthew's chapel (Cobleskill & Sharon Springs, NY) and now to Trinity (Brewster, NY).

However amidst my reflections about these various changes and where I have been and come during the past 25 years is the sense that ministry has been less about the places and the things and much more about the **people**. When I reflect on where I have been, it is the people that are foremost in my thoughts. It is the joys and sorrows that we shared. It is the faith lived that stands out amongst everything else.

My 25th anniversary of my ordination is not about what I have accomplished but how God has worked through me and many other people of faith to further God's mission in the world.

The first Sunday in November is All Saints' Sunday. It is the day that we mark to remember those saints who have gone before us as we light



candles and lift their names up in prayer. I will not only be remembering Michael but as I mark 25 years, I will also be thinking about all those saints who have journeyed with me in my own life of faith.

Who are and were the saints in your own life? How did they share their love of God with you? How did and how do their lives reflect the love and grace of Christ daily?

We are all saints by the grace of God. We are given the blessing of God's love and forgiveness daily – not just to keep for ourselves but to share with all whom we encounter every day.

I give thanks for all the saints – past and present – who have touched my life with God's love and grace.

I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, because of your sharing from the first day until now. (Philippians 1:3-5)

The Bad News – income is down a bit at \$6K and expenses are up slightly at \$1K. I am not pessimistic, because I know we can do better. We have to do better to keep Trinity going.

The Good News – Last year we had a \$20K deficit at the end of September, but we finished the year with \$17K in our checkbook. This year we have an even bigger \$27K deficit at the end of September, but I know we can repeat what we did last year. With the same generosity, we can finish the year with at least \$10K in our checkbook. Each of us just needs to give a little more each week through the end of the year. This should give us enough to start the year and get us through until our mortgage ends in December of 2018.

This is what we call Stewardship. God gave us all of this. We owe it to him to take care of it and nurture it in His name.

Midnight Run

The Midnight Run on October 1st was a great success. With your generosity we were able to provide 55-60 homeless men and women with a warm breakfast sandwich, a bagged lunch with a sandwich including fruit, granola bars, candy, egg, juice, a set of underwear, a toiletry kit, and assorted warm clothing. They were very thankful and appreciative of your caring. Here is a breakdown of the monies collected and spent:

- Thrivent monies: \$250.00
- Collected from congregation: \$152.00
- Underwear (t-shirt, briefs, socks) \$151.87
- Toiletries: \$147.11
- Food and paper goods: \$268.38
- Total Received: \$402.00
- Total Spent: \$567.36

We spent less this year compared to last year because we had leftover items from last year and we received more donations this year. (See page 8 to learn more about Midnight Run)

Thanksgiving Baskets for Putnam CAP

Starting November 1st Trinity will be participating in the Thanksgiving Food Basket program for Putnam CAP. The baskets provide a meal to low-income residents of Putnam County. Last year, Putnam CAP distributed over 400 baskets to these struggling families. The Thanksgiving Food Basket can be a cardboard box wrapped with festive paper, a laundry basket, a recyclable shopping bag, a gift bag or any other similar type of container. Putnam CAP asks that the food box contain all of the items needed to make a traditional Thanksgiving Dinner as well as some additional items such as breakfast foods and food for another meal during the week. All food baskets should include a \$15 grocery store gift card for the purchase of a turkey. The completed baskets must be returned to Trinity no later than November 13th.

What is the Midnight Run?

Midnight Run is a volunteer organization formed in 1984 by members of the South Presbyterian Church in Dobbs Ferry and is dedicated to helping the homeless of NYC. Feeding the homeless happens daily throughout the year. On most days there are multiple locations throughout the city served by volunteer organizations such as churches, synagogues, schools, and other civic groups, and South Presbyterian coordinates their efforts. Through Midnight Run, volunteers come to see the homeless as real people, not an abstract concept.

Trinity does one midnight run per year in October. We prepare 70 breakfast sandwiches, lunches, toiletry bags, and underwear bags and collect used clothing. The past two years we have served the homeless poor in Stuyvesant Cove Park in lower Manhattan. What better way to serve the Lord.

Midnight Run – October 1st

“Thank you for thinking of us”, “You are such a blessing”, “You have made my day”, “I will eat for a week”, “Trinity Lutheran Church is the best”, “We are so grateful”, “When will you be back”, “Are you here every year, the same day?” These are just a few of the comments I heard at our midnight run on October 1st. It is so nice to hear these words from the men and women of NYC we served on October 1st.

Our church was able to feed about 50-55 people and some received multiple sandwiches both hot and cold. The people loved our egg and cheese and egg and bacon sandwiches. Along with a hot sandwich, we were able to offer them a choice of a turkey, cheese, and ham sandwiches along with a bag of snacks of chips, hard-boiled eggs, fruit juice, water, candy, cookies, and granola bars. You may say “wow, that sounds like a lot of food.” It was, but you



should know how appreciative they were and how nice it was to see the smiles on the many faces. They said the food would feed them for the day and beyond.

This year eight members of the Patterson Venture Crew 1776 joined us Sunday morning to see what is involved in doing a run. Thank you for your support of help, money, food, toiletries and used clothing. Without everyone’s help it would not be possible to do such a large event. However, we are in need of more donations and more participation. We were short toiletries and underwear but instead of cutting back, with the generosity of a few folks we made up the shortfalls. I hope to change this in the coming year.

Stay tuned to hear more in the coming months as we prepare for our next run. Think about how you can help us next year. Your generosity is key to making this happen and everyone needs to be involved. I can’t stress enough that donations give us the means but actual participation is key to making this event a success. Make a difference in the world.

Midnight Run 2018 Event

In January, I will be placing a plastic tub in the narthex to start collecting toiletries, men’s underwear and socks. As you shop each week buy a few travel size toiletries such as shampoo, soap, shaving cream and razors for the run. Or when you go to the dentist yearly and they give you floss, toothpaste, and a toothbrush, save them for Trinity. When you are shopping in Walmart or Target, pickup a package of men’s t-shirts or underwear sizes M-XL or men’s socks and put them in the plastic tub. If we do this gradually you won’t feel the pinch and by the time the run comes along next October, we will have enough for the 60-70 people we serve. As always if you can’t shop and would like to donate please give your donation in the weekly collection and mark it ‘Midnight Run.’

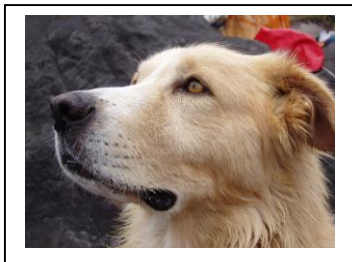

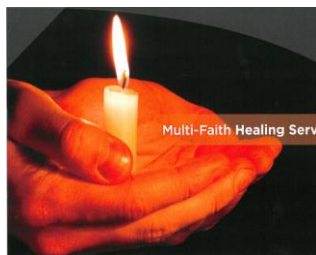
