Pastoral Reflections – Symbols of faith

Our beginnings as the Lutheran Church are marked historically by Martin Luther's nailing of his 95 theses (statements) calling for the reform of the Church of his day on Oct. 31, 1517. Luther was a prolific writer of letters, hymns, sermons and other writings that sought to express not just the need for reform, but as an expression of faith and trust in God's promises revealed through Jesus Christ.

As much as the written word is vital to learning and growing of faith — oftentimes, symbols can bear a wealth of meaning that enhance our understandings of God. For instance, a cross while a symbol of death in Roman times — stands as a reminder of hope, of life after death, that death does not have the final word in our world. The upright post points us to God while the cross beams shows arms open wide to all people, gathering us together in community.

One of the gifts from the time of the Reformation is Luther's seal which serves as both an expression and summary of his faith. It is a visual and imaginative reminder to meditate upon and to learn from. For those who were illiterate in Luther's day, it became a teaching tool.

In a letter to his friend, Lazarus Spengler (who was the designer of the seal for Luther), Martin Luther wrote:



"Grace and peace from the Lord. As you desire to know whether my painted seal, which you sent to me, has hit the mark, I shall answer most amiably and tell you my original thoughts and reason about why my seal is

a symbol of my theology. The first should be a black cross in a heart, which retains its natural color, so that I myself would be reminded that faith in the Crucified saves us. For one who believes from the heart will be justified" (Rom. 10:10). Although it is indeed a black cross, which mortifies and which should also cause pain, it

leaves the heart in its natural color. It does not corrupt nature, that is, it does not kill but keeps alive. "The just shall live by faith" (Rom. 1:17) but by faith in the crucified. Such a heart should stand in the middle of a white rose, to show that faith gives joy, comfort, and peace. In other words, it places the believer into a white, joyous rose, for this faith does not give peace and joy like the world gives (John 14:27). That is why the rose should be white and not red, for white is the color of the spirits and the angels (cf. Matthew 28:3: John 20:12). Such a rose should stand in a sky-blue field, symbolizing that such joy in spirit and faith is a beginning of the heavenly future joy, which begins already, but is grasped in hope, not yet revealed. And around this field is a golden ring, symbolizing that such blessedness in Heaven lasts forever and has no end. Such blessedness is exquisite, beyond all joy and goods, just as gold is the most valuable, most precious and best metal. This is my compendium theoligae [summary of theology]. I have wanted to show it to you in good friendship, hoping for your appreciation. May Christ, our beloved Lord, be with your spirit until the life hereafter. Amen."

You are invited to use this symbol and its meanings as a part of your own reflections. Look up the scripture verses included in Luther's letter to add to your devotions.

If you were to create your own seal or symbol of faith – what might you include? What is central to your understanding of God?

Off the shelf - TLC Faith Book club


