

Suffer and serve till all are fed, and show how grandly love intends to work till all creation sings, to fill all worlds, to crown all things.




READING: Psalm 5:7-8

INVITATION TO LENT

Friends in Christ, today with the whole church we enter the time of remembering Jesus' pass-over from death to life, and in our remembering, our life in Christ is renewed.

We are created to experience joy in communion with God, to love one another, and to live in harmony with creation. But our sinful rebellion separates us from God, our neighbors, and creation, so that we do not enjoy the life our creator intended.

We begin this holy season by acknowledging our need for repentance and for God's mercy. Repentance invites us to turn around and set our face in the same direction as Jesus. Life gives us many reasons to turn aside, but Christ calls us to hold fast to his way, even when it means letting go of those things that try to claim our attention. As we enter this season, we begin by turning ourselves, body, mind, and spirit, away from destructive powers and toward healing and life, and we commit ourselves to face forward to God's kingdom. As disciples of Jesus, we are called to a discipline that contends against evil and resists whatever leads us away from love of God and neighbor.

I invite you, therefore, to the discipline of Lent–self-examination and repentance, prayer and fasting, sacrificial giving and works of love– strengthened by the gifts of word and sacrament. Let us continue our journey through these forty days to the great Three Days of Jesus' death and resurrection.

CONFESSION OF SIN

Let us confess our sin in the presence of God and of one another.

You are invited to sit or to kneel as you are able. Silence is kept for reflection and self-examination.

Most holy and merciful God,

we confess to you and to one another,

and before the whole company of heaven,

that we have sinned by our fault,

by our own fault,

by our own most grievous fault,

in thought, word, and deed,

by what we have done and by what we have left undone.

We have not loved you with our whole heart, and mind, and strength. We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We have not forgiven others as we have been forgiven.

Have mercy on us, O God.

We have shut our ears to your call to serve as Christ served us. We have not been true to the mind of Christ. We have grieved your Holy Spirit.

Have mercy on us, O God.

Our past unfaithfulness, the pride, envy, hypocrisy, and apathy that have infected our lives, we confess to you.

Have mercy on us, O God.

Our self-indulgent appetites and ways, and our exploitation of other people, we confess to you.

Have mercy on us, O God.

Our negligence in prayer and worship, and our failure to share the faith that is in us, we confess to you.

Have mercy on us, O God.

Our neglect of human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty, we confess to you.

Have mercy on us, O God.

Our false judgments, our uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbors, and our prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us, we confess to you.

Have mercy on us, O God.

Our waste and pollution of your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us, we confess to you.

Have mercy on us, O God.

Restore us, O God, and let your anger depart from us.

Hear us, O God, for your mercy is great.

TURNING BACK TO CHRIST

As we are unable to impose ashes in the traditional way this year, you are invited into this liturgy that draws on the Hebrew meaning of SHUV -"repentance" meaning "to turn around."

You will need: something to look at —either on the screen in front of you or on a cross, an icon, an image of Jesus, or candle in your homes If you have ashes (or flour may be used), have them ready to be used. If you are comfortable doing so, I invite you to stand up and turn your body away, so that you cannot see the screen or item of your choosing. If you are not comfortable standing, turn your head as far to the side, or up, or down, as possible. As each question is asked, if you are willing, answer with "I do" or "I will" and turn yourself around a little, and a little, looking in all the other directions, until by the time you answer the fourth question, you are facing the again. You will mark a portion of the cross on your forehead as you turn.

Do you renounce evil and all its works, committing yourself to the path of abundant life for all creation — do you? I do. (*Turn a bit, draw half of the vertical part of the cross*)

Trusting in the gifts of the Holy Spirit, will you lay aside the ways of destruction, choosing the harder path of healing — will you? I will. (*Turn a bit, draw the other half of the vertical part of the cross*)

Hearing the call of Christ to you and to our community, will you examine yourself honestly and seek to repair any harm you have done — will you? I will. (*Turn a bit, draw half of the horizontal part of the cross*)

Knowing where the journey leads and trusting in the guidance of the Spirit, do you set your face toward God's kingdom, accepting that means giving up other ways — do you? I do. (*Turn fully toward the object/image, draw last half of the horizontal part of the cross*)

Fix your eyes upon Jesus. Give him your full attention. However tempting it may be to look away, set your face toward his way and follow where he is leading. We are but dust and breath, yet in Christ's way is life. **Amen.**

Prayers of Intercession

We pause to humbly offer up our prayers before God for the church, the world, and all those in need.

A brief silence

We all allow worries and distractions to consume us from time to time. Keep us focused on you and teach us to trust that we will be led, step by step, through all adversity and challenge. Faithful God, **Hear our prayer.**

May the reminder of our human limitations humble us but not drive us to despair. May the frailty of this existence compel us to live each day that we are given to the fullest. Faithful God, **Hear our prayer.**

There is now no turning back the clock on the state to which we've brought this earth through our negligence and lack of imagination. But lead us to explore and discover new pathways to restoration and preservation of what remains, for the sake of creation and our future existence within it. Faithful God, **Hear our prayer.**

Forgive us when we don't make time for those who truly need us, O Lord, and turn us away from our trivial concerns and towards the world around us. Bless all those in need of your healing, especially those that we name before you, those who have no one to name them and those who do not know Christ's name. Faithful God, **Hear our prayer.**

All the saints who have gone before us now rest in your eternal glory. Make us worthy to join them on that day when we are called to our heavenly home. Faithful God, **Hear our prayer.**

Here other petitions may be offered silently, aloud or in the comments.

Pastor: You hear all your children's prayers and gather the lost into your loving arms. Teach us to put our trust in you, and in our Lord and savior Jesus Christ. **Amen.**

Music Notes: Johann Kuhnau (1660 – 1722) was a German polymath: known primarily as composer today, he was also active as novelist, translator, lawyer, and music theorist, being able late in life to combine these activities with the duties of his official post of Thomaskantor in Leipzig, which he occupied for 21 years. Much of his music, including operas, masses, and other large-scale vocal works, is lost. His reputation today rests on a set of programmatic keyboard sonatas published in 1700, in which each sonata depicted in detail a particular story from the Bible. After his death, Kuhnau was succeeded as Thomaskantor by Johann Sebastian Bach.

Thomas Attwood (1765-1838), English composer, the son of a coal merchant who had musical tastes, was born in London on the 23rd of November 1765. At the age of nine he became a chorister in the Chapel Royal, where he remained for five years. In 1783 he was sent to study abroad at the expense of the prince of Wales (afterwards George IV.), who had been favourably impressed by his skill at the harpsichord. After spending two years at Naples, Attwood proceeded to Vienna, where he became a favourite pupil of Mozart. On his return to London in 1787 he held for a short time an appointment as one of the chamber musicians to the prince of Wales. In 1796 he was chosen organist of St Paul's, and in the same year he was made composer to the Chapel Royal.

Different Lenten practices appeal to a variety of people, so here is one more that might you might be interested in for your own Lenten journey (with thanks to the Upstate NY Synod, ELCA for the idea).

Beginning Ash Wednesday, February 17, and throughout the season of Lent, join the virtual walk with Pastor Jen and others in the congregation while learning more about issues of hunger and what we can do to help. Pastor Jen will periodically share

some of the stories from the ELCA World Hunger programs.

How to participate:

1. Make a commitment to walk at least 40 miles in the 40 days of Lent and donate \$40 to ELCA World Hunger. You can walk in the great outdoors or just around your house as you develop this shared Lenten practice of walking, praying, and giving financially to the work of ending hunger.
