Jesus calls us from the worship of the vain world's golden store, From each idol that would keep us, Saying, "Christian, love me more."


In our joys and in our sorrows, days of toil and hours of ease, Still he calls, in cares and pleasures, "Christian, love me more than these."

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. 'Teacher,' he said, 'what must I do to inherit eternal life?' He said to him, 'What is written in the law? What do you read there?' He answered, 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbour as yourself.' And he said to him, 'You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live.'

But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' Jesus replied, 'A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan while travelling came near him; and when he saw him, he was moved with pity. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, "Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend." Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?' He said, 'The one who showed him mercy.' Jesus said to him, 'Go and do likewise.'

Now as they went on their way, he entered a certain village, where a woman named Martha welcomed him into her home. She had a sister named Mary, who sat at the Lord's feet and listened to what he was saying. But Martha was distracted by her many tasks; so she came to him and asked, 'Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me to do all the work by myself? Tell her then to help me.' But the Lord answered her, 'Martha, Martha, you are worried and distracted by many things; there is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part, which will not be taken away from her.'

Join our prayers and praise with your prophets and martyrs of every age, that, rejoicing in the hope of the resurrection we might live in the freedom and hope of your Son.


Through Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honor is yours, almighty Father, now and forever. Amen

Music Notes:

Lee Hastings Bristol (1923-1979) was an American Episcopal church musician and Insurance agent. He had served as a member and officer of the Episcopal Church's Standing Commission on Church Music, helped organize the Hymnal Supplement volumes, was the editor of "More Hymns and Spiritual Songs" and wrote many choral and organ compositions. Bristol was also known to the wider Church as an engaging and popular preacher and conference speaker. He is believed to be the first American layman ever to preach four times at Westminster Abbey. He has also written inspirational books. A 1947 alumnus of Hamilton College, he earned a Licentiate in Organ from Trinity College of Music, London and had received 11 honorary degrees. He was president of the Westminster Choir College, one of the foremost church music institutions in the country, from 1962 to 1969. He once said of his ministry, "I continue to try with God's help, to come ever closer to my true potential and to try to see to it that my life counts for something in terms of the lives of others." He and His wife, Louise Wells Bristol had four children.
